### **January Gambling Commission Meeting Minutes**

#### **Executive Session Call to Order**

Chair Sizemore called the January Gambling Commission Meeting to order at 10:35 a.m. and immediately went into Executive Session to discuss Tribal Negotiations, Pending Investigations and Litigation.

#### **Public Session Call to Order**

Chair Sizemore called the Gambling Commission to order at 12:35 p.m. Chair Sizemore announced that because the Gambling Commission is a law enforcement agency, he intends to open each meeting with a moment of silence for those officers killed in the line of duty. Today's moment of silence was dedicated to Deputy Daniel McCartney. Deputy McCartney was shot in the line of duty January 8<sup>th</sup>, 2018.

Chair Sizemore welcomed everyone to the Hampton Inn & Suites and introductions were made. The meeting immediately started with the approval of part three of Tab 1, Snoqualmie Class III License Certification.

Commissioner Patterson moved to approve the Snoqualmie Class III Gaming Employees Certifications as presented in the consent agenda.

Commissioner Troyer seconded the Motion.

The Motion passed. 3:0

Commissioner Stearns abstained.

Commissioner Troyer had to leave the meeting and was not present for the remainder of the action items.

There were 42 people in attendance.

The Chair adjusted the agenda to accommodate Senator Phil Fortunato's schedule. Brian Considine, Legal and Legislative Manager, and Senator Fortunato spoke about ESSB 5671. **Manager Considine** mentioned the Commission voted to oppose the bill last year due to staff concerns. This bill increases the number of raffles open to the public to four events per year and increases the maximum revenue limits for raffles to \$10,000. This bill also: authorizes tiered levels of discounted packages for raffle tickets; modifies the process for conducting random draw raffle events involving a physical item selected by a participant, commonly referred to as duck draws; and redefines the term raffle to eliminate the need for an accompanying ticket for certain duck draw events.

Commissioner Patterson asked staff to expand on the concerns expressed in the bill regarding the limits an organization can bring in when the organization is not licensed. Manager Considine explained that with increases in the potential revenue that comes in, it has potential for increased crime. Staff felt a neutral position was for \$10,000. Chair Sizemore thanked the Senator for coming to the Commission Meeting.

#### Tab 1

#### **Consent Agenda:**

November Commission Meeting Minutes/ New Licensees Commissioner Patterson moved to approve the Consent Agenda as presented. Commissioner Stearns seconded the Motion. The Motion passed. 3:0

Director Trujillo introduced Washington State Gambling Commission's Newest Agent, Jason Downing. Special Agent Downing joined the Licensing Unit on December 28, 2017.

#### Tab 1 2018 Legislative Update

Legal and Legislative Manager Brian Considine presented the legislative materials in Tab 1. Manager Considine spoke about the 2018 legislative session and the bills specifically linked to the Gambling Commission. The Gambling Commission does not have any agency request legislation bills for 2018. He discussed Representative Sawyer's House Bill 2332 concerning problem gambling. Commissioner Patterson, Director Trujillo along with himself testified in favor of HB 2332 on January 9<sup>th</sup>. No one opposed. The bill specifically directs the commission to create a self-exclusion program by June 30th of 2020. Manager Considine explained that a one-time startup cost would be needed to create a software infrastructure through IT, education, and outreach. The agency estimates that startup costs to the agency are about \$47,000. In addition, he said that Senator Conway agreed to be the prime sponsor on companion bill Senate Bill 6331 and that a Senate hearing will help educate the Senate, Labor, and Commerce Committees on the self-exclusion and problem gambling issues. Commissioner Patterson said it would be very beneficial to the success of HB 2332 if the Gambling Commission took a favorable position.

Commissioner Patterson moved that the Gambling Commission support HB 2332 and companion Senate Bill 6331 and direct staff to notify the appropriate legislators and committees of Commission's support and attempt to secure a one-time appropriation to offset the cost of establishing this program.

Commissioner Stearns seconded the Motion.

The Motion passed. 3:0

**Commissioner Patterson** said this is a wonderful opportunity to make a real difference with regard to the issue of problem gambling in this state. She said, right now, if someone was a problem gambler in this state, and had moments of clarity, and would like to do something to prevent themselves from falling back into their addiction, the person must go to each gambling location and ask to be self-barred. One thing we don't have in this state is the ability for those citizens of ours to go to one central place and bar themselves from all establishments. She explained that this bill will not automatically include the tribes. However, it has language that invites the tribes to participate voluntarily and allows time for staff to engage the tribes with our hopes that, eventually, they will participate. If it passes, it means that we here at the Gambling Commission will be writing the rules on how to create that statewide system for self-barring. Commissioner Patterson reiterated that it's an excellent first step but one of the steps that we need to be taking to address the problem. Commissioner Stearns also said he agrees that the Gambling Commission should support HB 2332. He said this bill is groundbreaking, and he has incredible respect and profound gratitude for all the work that's gone into it, and his view is that this is the first step. He says problem gambling is an under-addressed issue nationally and in our state. And, he said the ability for people to self-exclude and to have it become less of a problem for them to do that is really vital for the people of Washington. Chair Sizemore concurred with both the statements from the Commissioners.

Manager Considine continued his Legislative update on the following bills.

#### **HB 2103**

Representative Sawyer's HB 2103 was introduced last year. It establishes a new appropriated account to fund the Gambling Commission's law enforcement duties. This bill is unlikely to be advanced in 2018.

#### **SB 5169**

Senator Ericksen's SB 5169 was introduced last year and it authorizes fantasy sports as contests of skill and excludes them from Washington's gambling laws. This bill is unlikely to be advanced in 2018.

#### **Initiative I-940**

I-940 is an initiative to the Legislature. It amends the criminal standard for prosecuting a law enforcement officer by removing the malice requirement currently in law and replacing it with an objective and subjective good faith standard that both must be met to receive immunity under the law.

The legislature will have three options during the 2018 legislative session: (1) adopt the initiative as proposed, with no amendments, and it becomes law without a vote of the people; (2)

no action and the initiative will be on the November 2018 general election ballot for a vote of the people; or (3) enact a different bill on the same subject and the bill and initiative will be on the November 2018 general election ballot for a vote of the people.

#### **Professional and Amateur Sports Protection Act (PASPA)**

On December 4, 2017, the U.S. Supreme Court heard oral arguments in *Christie v. NCAA*, *et al.* and *New Jersey Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association v. NCAA*, *et al.* The court will determine if PASPA is constitutional and/or New Jersey's repeal of its laws prohibiting sports betting was lawful. The U.S. Supreme Court will decide no later than July 2018 if PASPA violates the 10<sup>th</sup> Amendment, which protects state's rights (federalism).

Commission staff will continue to identify the possible impacts of a court decision invalidating PASPA.

#### **Director's Report**

<u>In addition to a written report this month,</u> <u>Director Trujillo</u> announced that the Gambling Commission has launched their new website. He recognized the Public Information Officer, Heather Songer for her work on the website. He also mentioned that Ms. Songer has been working with Pierce County Sheriff's office on an agency assist to help in the Joint Information Center in preparation with events surrounding the line of duty death and planning the funeral of Deputy Sheriff Daniel McCartney.

Director Trujillo acknowledged Mr. Eric Durban from the Muckleshoot Casino who was in the audience. He said Mr. Durban previously announced his retirement as Chief Financial Officer from Muckleshoot Casino. Director Trujillo said he has known Mr. Durban for many years and shared two short stories with the Commission. He will present Mr. Durban with an agency coin at his next opportunity.

Director Trujillo reported on the Spokane Tribal Casino's opening on January 8, 2018. He said that despite the weather and cold temperatures, many people were waiting for the doors to open. Director Trujillo also shared that the Gambling Commission is planning a strategic planning work session at the April Commissioner meeting. He will share a short introduction of the process at the February Commission meeting. At the March Commission meeting he will do a presentation that builds on February's presentation that will further define the April strategic planning work session.

Director Trujillo reported that the Governor's Office is still considering candidates for the vacant position on the Gambling Commission.

Finally, Director Trujillo gave a brief update on pull-tabs. He reminded everyone that in his opinion discussing the topic was not discussing an expansion of gambling. He explained that it made sense to see how we can look at technology or modernization of pull-tabs dispensers to help to eliminate cheating and theft. He said that no one has asked to do away with paper. Paper is integral to the play of pull-tabs in Washington. He also said that if someone requests to do away with "paper," that may make the discussion a topic for the Legislature. He said before committing staff to a lot of research on how modernizing pull-tab dispensers, he asked the Commissioners how they felt about this topic. **Chair Sizemore** explained that staff didn't have time that would be necessary, in the short- and mid-range time period, to really get into the depth

and breadth that this topic would require and that this may be discussed later in the year as a strategic topic.

#### Tab 2

#### **Defaults**

Staff Attorney, Haylee Mills presented the materials for Tab 2.

Commissioner Patterson moved to revoke the Card Room Punch Pull-Tab License Revocation for MEWE, Inc. dba Viking Card Room.

Commissioner Stearns seconded the Motion.

The Motion passed. 3:0

Commissioner Stearns moved to revoke the Class III Certification for Sasheen L. White. Commissioner Patterson seconded the Motion.

#### Tab 3

#### **Staff Request for Rule Changes/Fee Simplification (Package #4)**

Assistant Director Tina Griffin presented the materials for Tab 3. This is the fourth Rule Changes/Fee Simplification package staff will bring forward to make changes to the Commission's licensing fee structure. This package clarifies that annual activity report filers will report their gambling activity for their license year through June 30, 2018 on July 30, 2018. All licensees will begin reporting their activity quarterly beginning with the July 1-September 30 quarter. The Rule Changes/Fee Simplification Package #4 will likely be up for final action at the March Commission Meeting.

**Public Comment:** There was no public comment.

Commissioner Patterson moved to file the Rule Changes/Fee Simplification Package #4 as presented by staff.

Commissioner Stearns seconded the Motion.

The Motion passed. 3:0

#### Tab 4

#### **Staff Request for Rule Changes/Fee Simplification (Package #1)**

**Assistant Director Tina Griffin** presented the materials for Tab 4. The Rule Changes/Fee Simplification Package #1 was the first Rule Changes/Fee Simplification package to be heard by the Commission in September 2017. At the January meeting there was no further discussion on the package. Staff recommends final action with an effective date of May 1, 2018, so that the licensees who are renewing June 30, 2018 will pay their fees under the new system.

**Public Comment:** There was no public comment.

Commissioner Patterson moved to approve the Fee Simplification Package #1 as presented by staff with an effective date of May 1, 2018.

Commissioner Stearns seconded the Motion.

The Motion passed. 3:0

#### Tab 5

#### **Staff Request for Rule Changes/Fee Simplification (Package #2)**

Assistant Director Griffin presented the materials for Tab 5. The Rule Changes/Fee Simplification Package #2 was first heard by the Commission in October 2017. Staff is asking for action to be taken on a couple rules in regards to this package. Package #2 deals with a number of rules, mainly removing the word "class" and then instead of using the word "class" or "license class," we now focus on the gross gambling receipts level of the licensee. This rules package also establishes new due dates for quarterly activity reports. It requires licensees to submit quarterly activity reports until they move into the new fee structure and then for the last quarter that they operated under the old fee structure, licensees will need to submit a quarterly activity report. Also, service suppliers will need to submit quarterly activity reports beginning with the third quarter of 2018. Lastly, it adds a process that we will use if a licensee doesn't submit to their quarterly license report or doesn't pay their quarterly licensing fees. Staff is requesting final action with an effective date of July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2018.

Commissioner Stearns moved to approve the Rule Changes/Fee Simplification Package #2, as presented by staff with an effective date of July 1<sup>st</sup>, 2018.

Commissioner Patterson seconded the Motion.

The Motion passed. 3:0

Public Comment: Aleena Schneider with Harlequin Productions gave public testimony regarding her concerns about the license fee increase of 150% for her company. She said that the real impact to her organization is that they are currently paying about \$680 a year, and the change would put them closer to \$1,700 a year; a 150% increase. And she said for a small nonprofit, \$1,000 is a huge expense. She added that she had sent in her comments, and was really pleasantly surprised when Mr. Trujillo called her to set up an appointment to come and talk to her. She stated that she understands things haven't changed, and the Commission is continuing forward so she wanted to come testify in person. She stated that she has an accounting background and thought the main problem was the decision to cap the fee at \$2,000. She added that the change serves to punish the small nonprofits and she can't imagine that was intentional. Chair Sizemore discussed the process and the key issues being addressed and that the 1973 structure was no longer reflective of today and the new structure more accurately reflected level of activity and effort. Director Trujillo offered to personally meet with her board. Chair Sizemore thanked Ms. Schneider for her testimony and asked her to come back and speak to the Commission after two quarters under the new structure and tell them how it is going.

#### Tab 6

#### **Staff Request for New Rule**

Assistant Director Griffin presented the materials for Tab 6. Staff is requesting this new rule to require a manufacture or its designee to submit electronic or mechanical gambling equipment for evaluation during rule-making. This rule will allow staff to request and evaluate equipment during the rule-making process. Commissioners first heard this request in September 2017. Staff recommends the Commissioners take final action effective 31 days from filing with the Code Reviser's Office.

Commissioner Patterson moved to approve WAC 230-17-192, as presented by staff effective 31 days from filing with the Code Reviser's Office.

Commissioner Stearns seconded the Motion.

The Motion passed. 3:0

**Public Comment:** There was no public comment.

#### Tab 7

#### **Staff Request for Rule Changes/Fee Simplification (Package #3)**

**Assistant Director Griffin** presented the materials for Tab 7. This Rule Changes/Fee Simplification package is the third rules packages. This package sets out the individual license fees under the new fee structure. Staff anticipates asking for an effective date of May 1, 2018, so that licensees who are renewing June 30, 2018 will pay their fees under the new system.

**Public Comment:** There was no public comment.

#### Other Business/General Discussion/Public Comment

**Commissioner Stearns** commented on the website and said it looked outstanding.

**Commissioner Patterson** commented that she will be at the capitol to testify on Representative Sawyer's bill HB 2332.

**Manager Brian Considine** added that Commissioner Patterson and Chair Sizemore will have confirmation hearings on January 17, 2018.

**Chair Sizemore** announced that our next meeting will be at the Hampton Inn and Suites on February 8, 2018.

Commission meeting adjourned at 2:57 p.m.

# Background/Structure

#### **General Information:**

Ainsworth Game Technology, Inc. is a manufacturer and supplier of game technology and game software. They intend to offer Class III Tribal Lottery Systems. They also applied as a distributor for the purposes of distributing machines with software manufactured by Ainsworth Game Technology, Limited, their parent company located in Australia.

We licensed Ainsworth Game Technology, Inc. on December 8, 2016. Leonard Ainsworth, who owned 53% of Ainsworth Game Technology, Inc., sold his shares to Novomatic AG, which triggered a new licensing event. According to WAC 230-06-108, when a person or business becomes the owner of more than 50% of the stock in a business and they were not previously a substantial interest holder, they must apply for a new license.

# Part II Licensing Investigations Summary

Special Agents from the Commission's Licensing Unit conducted a criminal history and financial investigation focusing on funding sources and beneficiaries for suitability in accordance with RCW 9.46 and WAC 230. Staff went on-site to Las Vegas, Nevada, to conduct their investigation, which included verifying the ownership structure, reviewing financial and business records, conducting interviews and observing the manufacturing process. The investigation found:

- No unreported people or businesses involved (i.e. substantial interest holders);
- No undisclosed ownership or undisclosed involvement in other activities/businesses;
- No disqualifying administrative history;
- All funding sources were disclosed; and
- All substantial interest holders qualify to hold a license.

#### Source of Funds:

Novomatic AG purchased 172,100,823 shares of Ainsworth Game Technologies stock for \$2.75/share AU. The total purchase price is \$473,277,263.25 AU. This coupled with shares already purchased on the public market by Novomatic AG would give them a total of 172,838,550 shares, a 53.58% ownership in Ainsworth.

Although Novomatic had the cash on hand to fund the purchase they funded the purchase through a series of bank loans and credit facilities.

The total available from three separate credit facilities was 440 million Euros.

Per a currency convertor, when the sale was consummated the 440 million Euros available was the equivalent of \$654,178,698 AU.

# Part III Staff Recommendations

Based upon the criminal history and financial background investigations, staff recommends licensing Ainsworth Game Technology, Inc., as a class "C" manufacturer and class "C" distributor.

The investigation found:

- No unreported people or businesses involved (i.e. substantial interest holders);
- No undisclosed ownership or undisclosed involvement in other activities/businesses;
- No disqualifying administrative history;

- All funding sources were disclosed; and
- All substantial interest holders qualify to hold a license.

#### Source of Funds:

Novomatic AG purchased 172,100,823 shares of Ainsworth Game Technologies stock for \$2.75/share AU. The total purchase price is \$473,277,263.25 AU. This coupled with shares already purchased on the public market by Novomatic AG gave them a total of 172,838,550 shares, a 53.58% ownership in Ainsworth.

Although Novomatic had the cash on hand to fund the purchase, they funded the purchase through a series of bank loans and credit facilities.

The total available from three separate credit facilities was 440 million Euros.

Per a currency convertor, when the sale was consummated the 440 million Euros available was the equivalent of \$654,178,698 AU.

# Part III Staff Recommendations

Based upon the criminal history and financial background investigations, staff recommends licensing Ainsworth Game Technology, Limited, as a class "C" manufacturer.

SUBJECT: LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

We are already into the fourth week of the 2018 60-day session. The following legislative cutoffs are happening soon:

- Friday, February 2, 2018 Policy committee cutoff;
- Tuesday, February 6, 2018 Fiscal committee cutoff; and
- Wednesday, February 14, 2018 Last day bills can be considered in its house of origin.

Additionally, sine die is on March 8, 2018, and it will occur prior to our March Commission Meeting.

Therefore, our February meeting will be the last opportunity to brief you on bills and for you vote to take a position on a bill. Below is a summary of noteworthy bills we are currently tracking, but many of these bills may be dead by the time we meet on February 8, 2018.

#### **Bills The Commission Voted to Support**:

#### 1. EHB 2332 (attached) and SB 6331, Concerning Gambling Addiction

Representative Sawyer's HB 2332 self-exclusion bill was passed out of the House, 94-3, on January 24, 2018, with an amendment. The amendment adds protections for personal information that we collect under the program. Staff does not have any concerns about these requirements at this time. The amended bill is now in Senate Labor and Commerce and should be heard and voted out of committee by the February 18, 2018 policy committee cutoff.

Senator Conway's SB 6331 is scheduled for a hearing on January 31, 2018. The expectation is the hearing will be a good opportunity to discuss self-exclusion and

problem gambling issues with the committee. The expectation is for the committee to pass EHB 2332 out of committee and it will not take action on SB 6331.

#### **Possible Legislation Action Items:**

# 2. <u>HB 2881, Creating a new crime applicable to platforms, including internet web sites,</u> that facilitate unauthorized gambling activity (attached)

Representative Sawyer's HB 2881 criminalizes the operation of an online website or platform that facilitates, or is used to facilitate, an unauthorized gambling activity. The bill makes it a Class C felony for a person to knowingly facilitate an illegal gambling where using virtual items are used as things of value.

This bill is meant to address issues related to the Commission's case with Valve and online "skin" gambling. The bill is scheduled for a hearing in the House Public Safety Committee on January 30, 2018. Commissioner Stearns, Director Trujillo, and I will testify on the bill. We will be neutral on the bill since you have not voted yet to take a position and will be there to provide background information on "skins," "skin" gambling, and what we learned through our investigation.

# 3. SB 6266, Concerning loot boxes in online games and apps (attached)

Senator Ranker's SB 6266 identifies the use of video game "loot boxes" as a topic the Commission should investigate and determine if it is gambling. Loot boxes are a digital "box" or "grab bag" that video game players have to spend real or in-game currency on. Opening the box gives the player a chance at obtaining a virtual item or currency that can be used in the video game. The player does not know what she or he will win. The items received in a loot box can be cosmetic, "skins" are an example, or something to help you perform better in the game. This topic received attention after E.A. Sports' Star Wars Battlefront II video game included loot boxes in the gameplay. Players became upset and complained the "pay to play" was wrong and was akin to gambling. However, the use of loot boxes has been around for a few years and was mostly found in online games like those found on Valve's platform or mobile device games.

SB 6266 requires the Commission to conduct a study and report to the Legislature by December 1, 2018 on the following topics: (1) Whether games and apps containing these mechanisms are considered gambling under Washington law; (2) whether these mechanisms belong in games and apps; (3) whether minors and other young people, who may be more vulnerable to gambling addiction, should have access to games and apps with these mechanisms; and (4) the lack of disclosure and transparency with respect to the odds of receiving each type of virtual item.

Director Trujillo and I met with Senator Ranker to discuss his bill. He is very concerned about the use of loot boxes and has discussed them with several company leaders within the gaming industry. He would like the Commission's support on his bill.

A hearing has been scheduled for January 31, 2018 in the Senate Labor and Commerce Committee. Commissioner Stearns, Director Trujillo, and I will testify on the bill. We

will be neutral on the bill since you have not voted yet to take a position and will be there to provide background information on loot boxes.

# **Bills with Direct Gambling Impacts.**

# 4. <u>HB 2416, Concerning workers at gambling establishments participating as a player in gambling activities</u>

Representative Kirby's HB 2416 had a hearing in House Commerce and Gaming on January 16, 2018. Director Trujillo and I testified on the bill. We were neutral and provided information and background on the topic. We had a good discussion about gambling employees gambling at their places of employment. Representative Kirby believes rule-making is the best way to address employees gambling at their places of employment. He has requested that his bill not move at this time and hopes the Commission will take up this issue if/when the rule petition is re-submitted in 2018.

# 5. ESSB 5671, An act relating to simplifying the process for bona fide charitable and nonprofit organization to engage in activities and social pastimes, and raise funds for their authorized purposes

Senator Fortunato discussed his ESSB 5671 and his raffle concerns with you at the January 2018 Commission meeting. I have had several discussions with him since the January meeting, and he would like to see the Commission enter into rule-making, if possible, to address his concerns related to discount raffle ticket packages and drawing of objects instead of a ticket in a raffle. Our position is currently opposed due to changes made to the operation of raffles, and I recommend that our position be unchanged until the problematic language is corrected or dropped from the bill. At this time, ESSB 5671 is unlikely to move out of the Senate and I do not believe any new vote by you is warranted at this time.

#### 6. <u>HB 2103, Concerning the gambling commission</u>

Representative Sawyer's HB 2103 was introduced last year and it establishes a new appropriated account to fund the Gambling Commission's law enforcement duties. This bill is not moving forward this session.

#### 7. SB 5169, Classifying fantasy sports contests as contests of skill

Senator Ericksen's SB 5169 was introduced last year and it authorizes fantasy sports as contests of skill and excludes them from Washington's gambling laws. This bill is not moving forward this session.

### **Law Enforcement Bills**

# 8. SHB 2718, Concerning seizure and forfeiture procedures and reporting

Representatives Shea and Goodman's HB 2718 address civil forfeiture standards and reporting. I briefed you on a draft bill during our January Commission meeting. This bill does not amend the Gambling Act. However, it creates some new civil forfeiture

reporting requirements for the Commission and all other law enforcement agencies. WASPC and other stakeholders have taken the lead on this bill due to concerns with some language in the amended bill, including some reporting requirements. We will continue to monitor the bill but I recommend taking no action at this time due to the likely minimal impact the bill will have on the agency.

# 9. <u>Initiative Measure Number 940 (I-940)</u>, <u>Police Training and Criminal Liability in Cases of Deadly Force Measure</u>

I-940 was certified by the Secretary of State and it is now filed with the Legislature. The legislature now has three options during the 2018 legislative session: (1) adopt the initiative as proposed, with no amendments, and it becomes law without a vote of the people; (2) no action and the initiative will be on the November 2018 general election ballot for a vote of the people; or (3) enact a different bill on the same subject and the bill and initiative will be on the November 2018 general election ballot for a vote of the people.

It is expected that the Legislature will not pass this initiative as a bill or pass a competing bill with a different criminal standard and training requirements. Therefore, we expect I-940 to be put to a vote of the people during the November 2018 general election.

## **Budget and Other Bills**

#### 10. HB 2299/SB 6032, supplemental operating appropriations

The House and Senate have filed their proposed 2018 supplemental budget bills. Neither bill impacts our gambling revolving account. Both bills maintain the current level of funding for the problem gambling account. Both bills reduce the state's contribution for employee health insurance payments from \$957/month to \$906/month – this would reduce the agency's FY19 costs by \$612/employee, a total of \$69,768 for our budgeted 114 employees. We will continue to monitor these fiscal bills and will report back to you if any changes are made that will impact the agency or the gambling revolving account.

# 11. <u>HB 2278, Concerning personal information privacy protections in government entities</u>

Representative Morris' HB 2278 was passed out of House State Government, Elections, and Information Technology. It has been referred to Transportation and is not yet scheduled for a hearing in this committee. This bill would impact the Commission, but many agencies have concerns about the impact and cost of this bill. The Governor's Office is organizing with the larger agencies to work and comment on this bill. We will continue to monitor it but I do not expect it to be passed into law, especially as it is currently written.

# **Problem Gambling Legislative Work Session**

12. The problem gaming work session in the House Commerce and Gaming Committee is tentatively scheduled for February 19, 2018, from 1:30 p.m. to 3:00 p.m. I have let Committee staff know that Commissioners Patterson and Stearns, Director Trujillo, and I

will participate in the work session. I will be working with committee staff to ensure we have a good group of presenters and successful work session.

# **Commissioner Confirmations**

13. Commissioner Sizemore and Commissioner Patterson had confirmation hearings in the Senate Labor and Commerce Committee on January 17, 2018. The Labor and Commerce Committee voted to confirm both Commissioners. They are now on the Senate Confirmation Calendar and will likely be confirmed by vote of the full Senate sometime in the next few weeks.

I am still working with Senate staff to have Commissioner Stearns and Commissioner Troyer also confirmed this session, if possible.

#### ENGROSSED HOUSE BILL 2332

State of Washington 65th Legislature 2018 Regular Session

- 3 (b) The legislature finds that problem and pathological gambling continues to negatively impact individuals and families in this 4 state. It is estimated that about five percent of adults in the state 5 6 will experience problem or pathological gambling behaviors in their lifetime. Previous and ongoing efforts to prevent and assist people 7 in treating problem and pathological gambling have proven beneficial, 8 such as increasing public awareness, funding treatment services for 9 10 individuals, and requiring informational signs in gambling establishments that include a toll-free hotline number for problem 11 and pathological gamblers. However, people and families facing 12 problem or pathological gambling issues will further benefit from the 13 availability of a uniform self-exclusion program where people may 14 voluntarily exclude themselves from gambling at multiple gambling 15 establishments by submitting one self-exclusion form to the state 16 17 from one location. It is the intent of subsection (3) of this section to establish such a uniform self-exclusion program to assist people 18 19 in preventing or ending problem or pathological gambling behaviors 20 permanently.
  - (2)(a) During any period in which RCW 82.04.285(2) is in effect, the commission may not increase fees payable by licensees under its jurisdiction for the purpose of funding services for problem and pathological gambling. Any fee imposed or increased by the commission, for the purpose of funding these services, before July 1, 2005, ((shall have)) has no force and effect after July 1, 2005.

Final Order – February 8, 2018 Commission Meeting

Ms. Tanesha J. Cayou has a certification authorizing Class III Employee activity at Emerald Queen Casino in Tacoma, Washington. Her certification expires on May 3, 2018.

On June 8, 2017, Ms. Cayou is alleged to have taken \$100.00 from a casino patron while the patron was at a player terminal, then fled toward and through a door. These actions were viewed on surveillance video, as well as corroborated by the patron in a written statement. Ms. Cayou was apprehended by casino security and her tribal gaming certification was revoked the same day. Ms. Cayou did not disclose the allegations or the revocation of her tribal gaming license to the Commission.

Director Trujillo issued a Notice of Administrative Charges on October 26, 2017, to Ms. Cayou by first class and certified mail to her last known address. The first class mail was returned on November 7, 2017 as "Return to Sender, Attempted-Not Know, Unable to Forward." The certified mail was returned on November 21, 2017 as "Return to Sender, Unclaimed, Unable to Forward." As of the date of this memo, the Commission has not received any response from Ms. Cayou.

Ms. Cayou's failure to respond to the charges or request a hearing is a waiver of Ms. Cayou's right to a hearing in Case No. CR 2017-01055. You may take final action against her gambling certification. Based on her conduct, Ms. Cayou cannot show by clear and convincing evidence that she is qualified to keep her gambling certification. Therefore, staff recommends that the Commission sign the proposed final order and revoke Tanesha J. Cayou's Class III Employee certification, License Number 69-39794.

Mr. Travis L. Van Pelt has a certification authorizing Class III Employee activity at Legends Casino in Toppenish, Washington. His certification expires on July 28, 2018.

On May 10, 2017, Mr. Van Pelt was indicted on a charge of Sexual Abuse of a Minor in the U.S. District Court in the Eastern District of Washington in Case Number 1:16-CR-02039-SAB. On February 15, 2017, Mr. Van Pelt entered a plea of guilty, and on July 28, 2017, the U.S. District Court in the Eastern District of Washington entered a judgment and sentence against Mr. Van Pelt. He was found guilty of Sexual Abuse of a Minor and sentenced to 20 months of confinement and supervision of 15 years upon release from prison.

On August 2, 2017, the Yakama Nation Gaming Commission summarily suspended Mr. Van Pelt's tribal gaming license based on the above-referenced criminal conviction, and on September 25, 2017, entered a final order revoking his tribal gaming license. Mr. Van Pelt did not disclose the indictment or the above criminal allegations or conviction to the Gambling Commission, or include them on his 2016 and 2017 Class III Employee Renewal Applications.

Director Trujillo issued a Notice of Administrative Charges on November 7, 2017, to Mr. Van Pelt by first class and certified mail to his last known address. A receipt for delivery of the certified mail was received on November 21, 2017, indicating that service was completed on November 16, 2017. As of the date of this memo, the Commission has not received any response from Mr. Van Pelt.

Mr. Van Pelt's failure to respond to the charges or request a hearing is a waiver of Mr. Van Pelt's right to a hearing in Case No. CR 2017-01049. You may take final action against his gambling certification. Based on his conduct, Mr. Van Pelt cannot show by clear and convincing evidence that he is qualified to keep his gambling certification. Therefore, staff recommends that the

#### Who Proposed the Rule Change?

Christopher Hancock, Olympia, Washington.

#### Describe the Petitioner's Request

Mr. Hancock submitted a petition for rule change requesting a change to the Commission's wagering limits for nonhouse-banked card games in WAC 230-15-135. The petitioner did not submit proposed amended rule language. Instead, he requests that the following limitations be removed from the rules:

- The requirement that there be no more than four wagers in any betting round (WAC 230-15-135(1)(b)); and
- The requirement that the maximum amount of a single wager must not exceed \$40 and a single wager in Class F and house-banked licensee card games must not exceed \$300 (WAC 230-15-135(1)(c)).

Mr. Hancock suggests that if the Commission wishes to restrict the amount of money a player can lose in a game of poker, it should simply place a restriction on the amount of money a player can buy into a poker game. Mr. Hancock suggests a maximum of 250 times the big blind as the limit for the amount of money a player can buy into a game.

#### Background

The Commission reviewed this rule in 2016 when it accepted the rule petitions from card room owners George Teeny and Teresa Malphrus. The Commission reviewed this rule from April 2016 until November 2016. The Commission then adopted a rule raising the wager limit for Class F and house-banked card room licensees from \$100 to \$300 for a single wager. This change went into effect on December 23, 2016.

#### Licensees Impacted

The proposed change would impact all Class E, F and house-banked card room licensees. As of February 1, 2018, there are 47 house-banked, 3 Class F, and 6 Class E licensed card rooms.

#### Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends denial of the petition. All Washington authorized gambling activities are limited in nature and scope by RCW 9.46.010 and have wagering limits.

The Commission must vote on this petition within 60 days of receiving it and you have the following options under the Administrative Procedure Act:

1) Initiate rule-making proceedings. Staff would then work with the petitioner and stakeholders on language to remove the above-referenced rules and bring amended rules to you to file for further discussion, which would also require a vote; or

2) Deny the petition in writing, stating the reasons for the denial and specifically address the concerns stated in the petition. If appropriate, the Commission must indicate alternative means by which the agency will address the concerns raised in the petition.

#### I am requesting the following change:

I want to eliminate or modify sections 1(b) and 1(c) of this WAC to allow for No Limit Texas Hold'em to be properly authorized. Specifically, eliminate the restriction on the number of wagers allowed in a round of betting, and eliminate the restriction on the size of wagers.

RCW 9.46.0282 authorizes the Commission to establish limits on wagers. This change is needed because:

As the rules currently stand, section 1b and section 1c make No Limit Texas Hold'em functionally banned in the state of Washington. Rule 1c is particularly egregious. It's as if Washington mandated that basketball be played in the state on 8 foot rims instead of 10 foot rims.

No Limit Texas Hold'em is probably the most popular card game in America, and it has long been the poker game featured at the main event of the World Series of Poker. Washington is woefully and embarrassingly behind on this. States like Nevada, New Mexico, and California manage to get by with rules that allow for No Limit Texas Hold'em to be played in card rooms and casinos around their states. Yet Washington has these smothering restrictions on wager increments and the number of raises in a round of betting.

If the Commission wishes to restrict the amount of money a player can lose in a game of poker, it should simply place a restriction on the amount of money a player can buy into \*a game\* with. (I would suggest a maximum of 250 times the big blind.) The rules as they currently exist only provide the appearance of protection, and they come at the cost of destroying the ability of the card rooms and casinos of the state to host the most popular poker game in the world. This surely reduces the amount of tax revenue the state collects.

#### The effect of this rule change will be:

Washington residents will no longer have to travel for a proper No Limit Texas Hold'em game. Tourists to Washington will be able to play the game in the state as well.

#### WAC 230-15-135

#### Wagering limits for nonhouse-banked card games.

Card room licensees must not exceed these wagering limits:

- (1) **Poker** -
- (a) There must be no more than five betting rounds in any one game; and
- (b) There must be no more than four wagers in any betting round, for example, the initial wager plus three raises; and
- (c) The maximum amount of a single wager must not exceed forty dollars; however, class F and house-banked card game licensees may offer a single wager not to exceed three hundred dollars:
- (2) **Games based on achieving a specific number of points** Each point must not exceed five cents in value;
- (3) **Ante** No more than the maximum wager allowed for the first betting round for any game, except for Panguingue (Pan). The ante may, by house rule:
- (a) Be made by one or more players, but the total ante may not exceed the maximum wager allowed for the first betting round; and
  - (b) Be used as part of a player's wager;
- (4) **Panguingue (Pan)** The maximum value of a chip must not exceed ten dollars. An ante must not exceed one chip. We prohibit doubling of conditions. Players going out may collect no more than two additional chips for going out from each participating player.

Summary of Fee Changes

#### **Policy Considerations**

The Commissioners began considering changing the fee structure in 2014. The current fee structure was created over 40 years ago. It began with 25 fees. Today the Gambling Commission has approximately 194 different fees for Commercial and Non-Profit organizations and individuals. This fee schedule is typically based on a "class" system, which can be cumbersome for licensees and agency staff. The Gambling Commission is looking to simplify this current system to allow it to be easier to navigate and have a licensing fee schedule that is more predictable for both the agency and its licensees.

### Staff Recommendation

Up for further discussion.

Staff requests an effective date of May 1, 2018, so that licensees who are renewing June 30, 2018, will pay their fees under the new system.

**NOTE 1:** Currently, distributor, linked bingo prize provider and service supplier representatives can only represent one distributor, linked bingo prize provider or service supplier at a time (WAC 230-03-330(1)). If a distributor, linked bingo prize provider or service supplier leaves their employer and goes to another employer during their license year, they have to reapply and pay the renewal fee of \$167. By adding a fee and rule language to allow these representatives to change employers, these representative will save \$102 if they change employers during their license year.

**NOTE 2:** Currently, manufacturer representatives can represent more than one manufacturer but they do not pay a fee when adding or changing employers (WAC 230-03-330(2) and (3)). The new rules will require manufacturer representatives to pay \$65 and tell us when they add or change employers during their license year.

#### Who Proposed the Rule Change?

Staff

#### Describe the Rule Changes

This is the fourth and likely last rules package staff will bring forward to make changes to the Commission's licensing fee structure. The fourth rules package:

- Clarifies that annual activity report filers will report their gambling activity for their license year through June 30, 2018 on July 30, 2018. All licensees will begin reporting their activity quarterly beginning with the July 1-September 30 quarter. These rules were included in rule package #2:
  - o WAC 230-05-102 All licensed organizations report activity quarterly beginning with the July 1, 2018 through September 30, 2018 quarter.
  - o WAC 230-07-155 Reporting annual activities for raffles, enhanced raffles, amusement games, Class A, B or C bingo, or combination licenses;
  - o WAC 230-07-160 Reporting annual activity for agricultural fairs; and
  - o WAC 230-09-056 Activity reports for fund-raising events.
  - o WAC 230-10-457 Activity reports for linked bingo prize providers.
  - o WAC 230-13-169 Annual activity reports for commercial amusement game licensees.
- Addresses I.D. Stamps:
  - o I.D. stamps will only be required for punchboards/pull-tabs and
  - The Commission will provide I.D. stamps to punchboards/pull-tab manufacturers at no cost;
  - o The following rules were revised:
    - WAC 230-10-040 Disposable bingo cards Additional requirements;
    - WAC 230-10-180 Electronic bingo card daubers requirements;
    - WAC 230-16-160 I.D. stamps for gambling equipment.
    - WAC 230-16-165 Obtaining I.D. stamps;
    - WAC 230-16-175 Placing I.D. stamps and records entry labels; and
    - WAC 230-16-180 Records retention for I.D. stamp records.

#### **Policy Considerations**

The Commissioners began considering changing the fee structure in 2014. The current fee structure was created over 40 years ago. It began with 25 fees. Today the Gambling Commission has approximately 194 different fees for Commercial and Non-Profit organizations and individuals. This fee schedule is typically based on a "class" system, which can be cumbersome for licensees and agency staff. The Gambling Commission is looking to simplify this current system to allow it to be easier to navigate and have a licensing fee schedule that is more predictable for both the agency and its licensees.

#### Staff Recommendation

Staff anticipates asking for an effective date of July 1, 2018.

WAC 230-05-102 All licensed organizations report activity quarterly beginning with the July 1, 2018, through September 30, 2018, quarter. (1) Beginning July 1, 2018, all licensed organizations must submit activity reports quarterly, regardless of whether they previously submitted reports annually, quarterly, or semi-annually and regardless of when their permit or license year ends.

- (2) This includes gambling service suppliers and any other licensed organizations that did not previously submit activity reports.
- (3) Licensed organizations that report annually must submit an activity report from the beginning of their license year through June 30, 2018. These reports are due July 30, 2018.

Beginning July 1, 2018, licensed organizations that report annually will report quarterly as set forth in this section.

(4) The activity reports must be in the format we require and must:

Cover the period:	Be received by us no later than:
July 1 through September 30	October 30
October 1 through December 31	January 30
January 1 through March 31	April 30
April 1 through June 30	July 30

(5) All licensed organizations must submit quarterly license fees to us for each licensed gambling activity after the first quarter of their license year that begins on or after July 1, 2018, as set forth in WAC 230-05-124.

When they pack a set or collation of cards in more than one shipping container, manufacturers may attach the I.D. stamp to the first container and print the I.D. stamp number on all remaining shipping containers.
- (2) Electronic pull-tab dispensers, electronic bingo card daubers, and electronic facsimile card tables Manufacturers or owners must attach I.D. stamps on the outside of the main body, in an area that is not normally removed and replaced, and in a way that does not obstruct the view of the pull-tabs available for play, the bingo cards, or the card facsimiles.
- (3) Electromechanical and mechanical pull-tab dispensers Manufacturers or owners must attach I.D. stamps on the outside of the main body, in an area that is not normally removed and replaced, and in a way that does not obstruct the view of the pull-tabs available for play or the card facsimiles. Licensees may discard records entry labels.
- (4) Amusement games Owners must attach I.D. stamps on the outside of the main body, in an area that is not normally removed and replaced, and in a way that does not obstruct the view of the amusement game prizes.))

- WAC 230-16-180 Record retention for I.D. stamp records. Manufacturers must keep records that provide an accountability trail for all I.D. stamps ((purchased)).

  - (a) The name of the purchaser;
  - (b) The date of the sale; and
  - (c) The invoice number recording the sale.
- (2) For all unused or damaged I.D. stamps, manufacturers must indefinitely retain the I.D. stamps or provide records that include enough detail to allow us to account for all I.D. stamps.
