February Gambling Commission Meeting Minutes Hampton Inn & Suites 4301 Martin Way E. Olympia Public Meeting February 14, 2019

Public Meeting Call to Order

Chair Bud Sizemore called the Gambling Commission meeting to order at 10:00 a.m. He announced that the commissioners would be going into executive session and that the estimated time for the public meeting to start was 12:00 p.m. In executive session, the commissioners discussed litigation, pending criminal investigations and tribal negotiations for approximately 90 minutes. The last 30 minutes of executive session was dedicated to discussing legal matters.

At 12:01 p.m., **Chair Sizemore** welcomed everyone to the Hampton Inn & Suites and introductions were made. He announced he would have to excuse himself from the meeting at or around 12:30 and Vice Chair Patterson would take over until his return. He estimated his return to be at 1:45 p.m. He also announced that Commissioner Levy would be joining the meeting via phone.

Chair Sizemore asked for a moment of silence to recognize law enforcement officers across the country and in this state who were lost in the line of duty since we last met.

There were 23 people in attendance.

Tab 1

Commissioner Patterson moved to approve the consent agenda as presented by staff. Commissioner Stearns seconded the motion.

The motion was passed 4:0

Commissioner Levy was not present for the vote.

Commissioner Patterson moved to approve the Class III certifications for the Snoqualmie and Cowlitz tribes.

Commissioner Troyer seconded the motion.

The motion passed. 3:0

Commissioner Levy was not present for the vote.

Commissioner Stearns abstained.

Director's Report

Director Trujillo directed the commissioners to the sports betting memo in their packets. There was no discussion about the memo.

Chair Sizemore left the meeting at 12: 35 p.m. Vice Chair Patterson took over chairing the meeting. At this time, Commissioner Levy joined the meeting via phone.

Vice Chair Patterson rearranged the agenda starting with Tab 6 so that the petitioners could catch their flight.

Tab 6

Petition Sci-Games

Brian Considine, Legal and Legislative Manager (**LLM**), presented the materials for this tab. Jacqueline Hunter, Director for Technical Compliance for Scientific Games, Bally Corporation and Michale Vizzo, Product Manager for Utility Product Line spoke about their petition. Scientific Games submitted a petition to change rules regarding gambling equipment secure connections. The change would allow specific gambling equipment - like card shufflers - to be connected to a secure network for billing purposes only.

Commissioner Patterson asked about the cost of doing this and if this would be available to both tribal and commercial card rooms. **Ms. Hunter** said that the current rate was 18 cents per shuffle. The minimum rate is \$125 per month. It is currently available in tribal casinos.

Commissioner Stearns moved to accept the petition and file the CR 101 notice of rule-making.

The motion was passed 4:0

The vote was unanimous.

Chair Sizemore was not present for the vote.

Tab 3

Defaults

LLM Considine, and Ashlie Laydon, Rules Coordinator, presented the materials for this tab.

Brenda M. Woodward, Class III employee certification revocation.

Staff recommended that commissioners revoke a Class III employee's certification, due to her criminal history. Ms. Woodward was originally granted a conditional certification. She violated the conditions when she was charged with new crimes.

Vice Chair Patterson asked if Ms. Brenda M. Woodward was in the audience. She was not.

Commissioner Stearns moved to revoke the Class III employee certification for Brenda M. Woodward. Commissioner Troyer seconded the motion.

The motion passed 4:0

Rodney M. Madison, public card room employee license revocation.

Staff recommended that commissioners revoke a public card room employee's license. While Mr. Madison was working as a security officer, he was tasked with securing a patron's credit card that was left behind. Instead, he was caught on camera attempting to withdraw cash at an ATM. His employment was terminated by the card room on August 10, 2018.

Vice Chair Patterson asked if Rodney M. Madison was in the audience. He was not.

Commissioner Stearns moved to revoke the public card room employee license certification for Rodney M. Madison.

Commissioner Levy seconded the motion.

The motion passed 4:0

Hung Le, public card room employee license revocation.

Staff recommended that commissioners revoke a public card room employee's license. While working as a blackjack dealer, he helped three players cheat by exposing his hole card & manipulating the deck to reveal the next card. He encouraged/discouraged bets based on this.

Vice Chair Patterson asked if Hung Le was in the audience. He was not.

Commissioner Stearns moved to revoke the public card room employee license certification for Hung Le.

Commissioner Troyer seconded the motion.

The motion passed 4:0

Carlos Rodriguez Bravo, public card room employee license revocation.

Staff recommended that commissioners revoke a public card room employee's license for Mr. Bravo as he was charged with, and pleaded guilty to, violating a domestic violence no-contact order. He failed to report the charges to WSGC as required.

Vice Chair Patterson asked if Mr. Bravo was in the audience. He was not.

Commissioner Stearns moved to revoke the public card room employee license certification for Carlos Rodriguez Bravo.

Commissioner Levy seconded the motion.

The motion passed 4:0

Duchess Tavern, Punchboard/Pull-Tab license suspension.

Staff recommended that commissioners suspend the punchboard/pull-tab license for Duchess Tavern in Seattle, as a result of failure to file reports and pay fees that were due on 10/30/18. However, payment was made within the last few days, so the licensee would be able to continue operations. The suspension decision would be documented in the licensee's file.

Commissioner Patterson asked for clarification on the different licenses for business entities and corporations. **Commissioner Stearns** asked for clarification on the quarterly payment amount that was due for a corporation.

Vice Chair Patterson asked if a representative from Duchess Tavern was in the audience. There was not.

Commissioner Troyer moved to suspend the Punchboard/Pull-Tab license for Duchess Tavern. Commissioner Stearns seconded the motion.

The motion passed 4:0

Tab 5

Raffle Request: Puget Sound Flyers

Assistant Director (AD) Tina Griffin presented the materials for this Tab. AD Griffin introduced Mr. Richard Newman from the Puget Sound Flyers to the commissioners. Commissioners voted unanimously to approve the Puget Sound Flyers' request to exceed the \$40,000 raffle prize limit. They will be raffling off a single-engine plane.

Commissioner Stearns moved to approve the request to exceed the 40k raffle prize limit for Puget Sound Flyers.

Commissioner Troyer seconded the motion.

The motion passed 4:0

Tab 7

Petition for Rule Change: Trade Shows

LLM Considine presented the materials for this tab. In January, commissioners voted to enter into rule-making to clarify requirements for trade shows, including transportation and storage of gambling equipment. Commissioners voted unanimously to initiate rule-making regarding trade shows. The staff petition for rule change seeks to clarify requirements for trade shows, including transportation and storage of gambling equipment. In order to be deployed on Indian Lands, Tribal Lottery Systems have to be approved and go through the process. LLM Considine stated that at a trade show, oftentimes people are trying to determine whether or not a system or game is even viable. There was discussion among the commissioners and staff regarding next steps. Draft language will be presented at the next meeting.

Tab 8

2019 Legislative Update

LLM Considine presented the material for this tab.

Commissioners voted unanimously to support HB1929 and HB1919, which amend definitions and strengthen penalties for animal abuse and animal fighting paraphernalia.

Commissioners also voted unanimously to support HB1159 and SB5248, which changes the definition of theft to include when a person conceals the property of another intending that the concealment will deprive the other person of its use or benefit.

Commissioners voted unanimously to support HB1356, which modifies peer support group counselor provisions regarding privileged communication.

Chair Sizemore returned to the meeting at 1:40 p.m.

Tab 4

Petition for Review - Numerica Credit Union

LLM Considine addressed the materials for this Tab. Ms. Shelley Ripley (via phone) represented Numerica Credit Union (NCU) case number CR 2018-00200.

LLM Considine, stated "How the Gambling Commission views this was that, by our action last month we have said that credit unions are a bonafide non-profit for our statute, and that utilizing the existing rules that we have to continue the licensing process for Numerica, and to give us an update in May. LLM Considine asked if that was an accurate depiction of what we were after.

Whereas, **Ms. Ripley** replied, Yes. **Chair Sizemore** stated that the Commission would like Numerica to get a license no later than May.

Chair Sizemore called for public comment. There was no public comment.

Commissioner Troyer moved to approve the motion to file the CR 101, notice of rulemaking. Commissioner Stearns seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

Tab 2

Problem Gambling Study

Dr. Kahlil Philander (WSU) and Dr. Ty Lostutter (UW) presented the results of their study on the availability of services for problem gamblers and their families, and their analysis of current prevention, treatment and recovery programs and services in our state. Staff discussed key findings and recommendations from problem gambling study. There should be two legislative priorities for 2019-20 legislative cycle – (1) create a statewide voluntary self-exclusion program, and (2) form a joint legislative task force on problem gambling.

Commissioners voted unanimously to support HB1880 and SB5818, which would create a legislative task force on problem gambling.

Chair Sizemore called for public comment.

Public Comment

Maureen Greeley, Evergreen Council on Problem Gambling. Ms. Greeley thanked the commission for contracting for the study by WSU and UofW. Even though it was a very tight timeframe to get this study done, there were a number of us who said, "Don't even attempt it, don't try it, don't go there because there isn't enough time or funding" she said. In her opinion, there were positives that come from the study. The most positive thing to come out of the study was this public forum and sharing that information. Though there have been brief studies done since the 1990s, nothing has been as extensive as the prevalence studies. This is the most complete discussion that has come out of any report that's been done since that time, and I think that's a great credit to the researchers, also to the people who participated in it. There are certain areas that you as a regulatory agency want to address and there are other areas you are going to say, "Not our bailiwick, somebody else needs to deal with this as a public health or social services area." And we are one of the partners who wants to help deal with that. So on the two areas that you brought up as most important. The study contains a wide range of results and recommendations, and among the key findings were suggestions regarding the need for comprehensive responsible gaming policies and training. Self-exclusion is one part of that, and a very important part of an overall responsible gaming policy or programs created by operators and partners to ensure a comprehensive program to meet the needs of guests and patrons according to Ms. Greeley.

Roxane Waldron, MPA, Problem Gambling Program Manager, Behavioral Health Programs Division of Behavioral Health and Recovery commented that as the program manager for the State Problem Gambling Program, on behalf of the Health Care Authority/Division of Behavioral Health & Recovery, extend her appreciation for this major efforts that the Problem Gambling Study Report represents to quantify the problem needs, treatment, and services in WA State. She says they have three main priorities for the State Problem Gambling Program in the next 6-24 months:

- o Identifying greatest needs for problem gambling treatment providers and coordinate with partners to increase access to care, especially focusing on outside the I-5 corridor and priority populations such as Asian, African-American Tribal, and Youth.
- O Adopting at least one treatment outcome measure to track effectiveness of state treatment program over time. Other states, such as California, are using more robust methods and we can learn from them.
- As part of behavioral health integration, increasing coordination with internal Health Care Authority Prevention and Communications units as well as the Department of Health. Currently updating the state program materials, website, and preparing for Problem Gambling Awareness Month in March.

Ms. Waldron also said she would be willing to present to the Gambling Commission on their addiction programs.

Dolores Chiechi, Executive Director, Recreational Gaming Association (RGA). Ms. Chiechi said "I wanted to speak to the task force legislation that's up for a hearing tomorrow, and just so no one's blindsided, while we will be supporting the bills we will also be mentioning that we think that is the horse, and the cart is the self-exclusion legislation. So, let's do the task force, look at everything we need to be doing, and then perhaps at a future date that self-exclusion program will come in. As you can imagine, what came to light in the study today makes us even more leery that in the future, in the next two years, that there will be full participation. So, I just wanted to make sure everybody is aware that's going be our testimony at the hearing tomorrow."

Commissioner Patterson asked **Ms. Chiechi** if RGA was no longer planning to support the self-exclusion bill.

Ms. Chiechi stated, "Correct. Although, RGA supports the concept of self-exclusion, we believe that the task force was the pre-requisite to self-exclusion."

Other Business/General Discussion/Public Comment

Chair Sizemore called for any further comment. There were no further comments. The next commission meeting will be on March 14 at the Hampton Inn & Suites Olympia/Lacey

Meeting adjourned at 3:58 p.m.



RCW 9.46.215 states that the possession or transportation of gambling equipment is illegal, unless it is in the furtherance of a gambling activity authorized by RCW or Commission rule. WAC 230-12-337, now WAC 230-16-005, was adopted and became effective in July, 2006, allowing licensed manufacturers and distributors to transport, display, and take orders for authorized gambling equipment at trade shows and conventions.

In 2018, there was a request to transport and display unapproved tribal lottery system machines at a Washington Indian Gaming Association tradeshow. Staff denied the request because the machines had not been tested in and approved by the Electronic Gaming Lab. Other instances have arose where manufacturers and/or distributors possessed gambling equipment, not yet approved by the Electronic Gaming Lab, in warehouses, which may be considered an unauthorized gambling activity and could also lead to jurisdictional issued depending upon the location of the warehouse.

Commissioners approved to initiate rule making at the January, 2019 Commission meeting.

At our February Commission Meeting, identified the two areas staff believes need clarification:

- Can devices that have not been approved by Washington State Gambling Commission but would be used for authorized gambling activities be displayed at tradeshows?
- Can devices used for unauthorized activities be displayed at tradeshows?

Both WAC 230-16-005 and WAC 230-06-050, review of electronic or mechanical gambling equipment, address when gambling equipment can be sold and leased. Changes to WAC 230-06-050 are necessary to make sure language is consistent with the changes to WAC 230-16-005.

Stakeholder Outreach and Feedback

A stakeholder meeting was convened on January 24, 2019 to discuss the timeline and potential language for clarifying WAC 230-16-005 in time for the WIGA trade show. Other areas of the rule surrounding possession, transportation, and storage of gambling equipment will continue to be addressed by the stakeholder group later this year.

We suggest using the terms "legal" or "pursuant to law".

It would be in the best interest of the tribes and the vendors for the state to allow new technology to be demonstrated in the state. The understanding for all parties concerned would be that demonstrated does not mean offered to the public. Offering something to the public for live play is the final standard for the tribes according to Compact and Appendix X2. Anything short of that is conceptual and has no impact on the general public.

The Tulalip Gaming Agency supports the Washington State Gambling Commission's efforts to update its rules to clarify and allow manufacturers and/or suppliers to showcase Class III gaming equipment or product at a user conference or tradeshow location prior to that manufacturer or supplier having to obtain approval through the standard WSGC EGL testing and approval process. In lieu, we may support a limited scope authorization from WSGC for the specific purpose of gambling equipment being exhibited or demonstrated at a user conference or trade show. It is well established and understood in the Washington state gambling jurisdiction that before gaming equipment can be offered for play on a live, production system; it must go through an independent testing lab, such as GLI or BMM, as well as the WSGC EGL for its approval. Requiring a manufacturer or supplier to go through the approval process prior to knowing whether there is an appetite for a particular game or product can be a time consuming and expensive effort.

- (1) "Trade show" when used in this section means an exhibition where licensed manufacturers and distributors promote their products and services to operators of authorized gambling activities in Washington; the exhibition is not open to the public; and it is of limited duration.
- (2) "Gambling equipment" as used in this section has the same meaning as in WAC 230-03-200.
- (3) "Demonstration mode" when used in this section means when gambling equipment cannot be used for actual wagering and the equipment's coin or bill acceptor is removed or physically restricted from use.
- (4) Licensed manufacturers and distributors may transport,

 display, and accept orders for the sale or lease of their

 products at trade shows only under the following conditions:
- (a) All products must be manufactured by a licensed manufacturer for: activities authorized by state laws or Tribal-

State Compacts, or is Class II gaming equipment as authorized by federal law for use on Tribal Lands; and

- (b) All gambling equipment physically displayed must be in demonstration mode and either:
 - (i) Approved for sale or lease in the state; or
- (ii) Not approved by us but is only used for authorized activities under state laws or Tribal-State Compacts, or is Class II gaming equipment as authorized by federal law for use on Tribal Lands, and is transported into the state no more than ten days before a trade show begins and is removed from the state within ten days following the last day of a trade show; and
- (c) Gambling equipment must have a sign posted in close proximity to the device that contains the phrase, "No one under 18 years of age is allowed to operate this machine."
- (5) Licensed manufacturers and distributors must provide notification that they will be transporting, displaying, or accepting orders for gambling equipment on a form prescribed by the Gambling Commission at least ten days before a specified trade show.

Background and Policy Considerations

Since the passage of the Gambling Act in 1973, the age limit for playing bingo has been eighteen unless accompanied by an immediate family member or guardian who is eighteen years or older.

The petition, if accepted, removes current bingo rules that allow persons under age eighteen to participate in bingo activities when accompanied by a parent or guardian. This change would:

- Impact nonprofits operating bingo as an unlicensed activity, unless offered as part of a school carnival or agricultural fair, and
- Removes decision-making of bingo operators and parents and guardians as to whether or not it is appropriate to let a person under age eighteen play bingo.

Stakeholder Outreach and Feedback

In summary, stakeholders are not in support of this petition. Implementing this change would have a very significant impact on granges, nonprofits, churches, community organizations, senior centers, and other organizations offering family bingo events, allowing minors to participate. Additionally, stakeholders state that bingo halls are already struggling and implementing this change would result in a loss of revenue.

Staff Recommendation

Under the requirements of the Administrative Procedure Act, the Commission must take action on a petition within 60 days of receiving it. Your options are:



Age restrictions for players.

No person must allow anyone under the age of eighteen to participate in gambling activities except:

- (1) To play in licensed bingo games when accompanied by an adult member of his or her immediate family or a guardian, who is at least eighteen years old:
 - (a) "Immediate family" means only the spouse, parents, or grandparents of an individual; and
 - (b) "Guardian" means only a court appointed, legal guardian of an individual; or

Dear Gambling Commission members,

As a coordinator of five Family Bingo Nights at St. Cecilia Catholic Church in Stanwood, I am deeply concerned about the new rule being proposed to limit the age of participants attending Bingo. When we started having Family Bingo Nights eight and a half years ago at our parish, the goal was to bring parishioners together: young and old and especially young families looking for a cheaper form of entertainment. Our Bingo nights were created with the idea of not giving out cash prizes, but prizes that ranged from board games to plush blankets to Kindle Fire tablets. The prices to buy Bingo cards and to rent daubers have been reasonable so as not to exclude the lower-income parishioners.

If the rule changes to raising the age limit to 18 years of age, you will be issuing a death warrant on providing family fun and entertainment for parishioners of all ages. You may not have experienced the face of a ten-year-old leaping out of their chair when they won a Bingo and picked an art set or a stuffed bear for a prize, but I have.

This proposed new rule is thinking of major halls and venues that provide cash prizes for the winners of a Bingo. I am prone to think that there are a lot of small churches and elementary schools that will have to shut down their Bingo operations, and that is simply not fair! I am also offended at the final comment in this proposal about children staying home and reading a good book. That is all fine and dandy, but can a family do that activity together and meet friends and parishioners alike? I think not! Please do not adopt this new rule proposal.

My name is Don Allen and I am the Parish Administrator for St Cecilia Catholic Church in Stanwood, WA 98292. I would like to formally speak against the proposal to change the rules to require all bingo participants to be at least 18 years old.

The rule is not needed because: It appears that the concern in Yakima has to do with them violating their own rules, not the rules of Washington state. We have bingo games that do not award money. Our mission with our bingo games is to provide a family-orientated function that promotes fellowship between our parishioners and their families. Winners receive no money and the prizes are suited to that end. Requiring bingo participants to be 18 and older, with no exceptions, would ultimately end our family bingo nights. This would be a sad end to a function that has been very successful in bring our families together.

Age restrictions for players.

No person must allow anyone under the age of eighteen to participate in gambling activities except:

- (1) To play in licensed bingo games when accompanied by an adult member of his or her immediate family or a guardian, who is at least eighteen years old:
- (a) "Immediate family" means only the spouse, parents, or grandparents of an individual; and
 - (b) "Guardian" means only a court-appointed, legal guardian of an individual; or
 - (2) To play bingo at agricultural fairs or school carnivals; or
 - (3) To play amusement games; or
 - (4) To sell raffle tickets for a charitable or nonprofit organization that:
 - (a) Has development of youth as a primary purpose; and
- (b) Has at least three members or advisors who are at least eighteen years old and who supervise the operation of the raffle; and
 - (c) Has an adult member or advisor designated as the manager for the raffle.

The effect of this poorly written request would be to limit the age of participants to 18 years old in more than just Bingo Play. If the entire rule were changed, then Boy Scout troops and Campfire groups would no longer be able to hold raffles or other fund raising activities. If the intent of the Petition is to just change the age for Bingo Play, it should be restricted to WAC-230-60-1 and -2.

Furthermore, I know a few local home schooling families that use the experiences of Bingo (and the gambling that comes with it) to supplement their math lessons with their children. This rule change would eliminate this fun and inventive way to incorporate math skills with school aged children.

St. Joe's Bingo implements the present WAC guidelines:

- (1) To play in licensed bingo games when accompanied by an adult member of his or her immediate family or a guardian, who is at least eighteen years old:
- (a) "Immediate family" means only the spouse, parents, or grandparents of an individual; and
 - (b) "Guardian" means only a court-appointed, legal guardian of an individual....

In addition to these present regulations, St. Joe's Bingo sets the age minimum of 12 even if accompanied by a parent, a step beyond the regulations. The only time it is changes is because of a special event such as family night or holiday's like Halloween or Christmas.

St. Joe's Bingo is not "bending the rules" and is following the present regulations. It is not bending the regulations, as suggested in the petition, nor is it "lying". These type of accusations are usually coming from someone who doesn't like having kids around or they think the kids are going to win and minimize their chances of winning. Most sessions do not have any children attending, so there is plenty of opportunity for that person who objects to the competition or being annoyed by children, to attend other sessions.

We are very aware about what playing Bingo is all about, for both adults and children, and discourage playing beyond what would be considered to be moderate and appropriate and spelled out in the present WAC's. Those adults that approve of their children accompanying them usually are doing so as a family event opportunity.

SUBJECT: LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

We are nearing the half-way point for the 2019 105-day session. The first policy and fiscal cutoffs have passed and last day bills can be considered in its house of origin is March 13, 2019—the day before our Commission Meeting.

The following legislative cutoffs will occur between our March and April Commission Meetings:

- Wednesday, April 3, 2019 Policy committee cutoff opposite house; and
- Tuesday, April 9, 2019 Fiscal committee cutoff opposite house.

Below is a summary of noteworthy bills we are tracking, including our agency request bills and bills we are supporting.

Agency Request Legislation:

1. SHB 1302 and SB 5416, Gambling Self Exclusion

SHB 1302 received a hearing in the House Appropriations Committee on February 20, 2019 and it was unanimously passed out of House Appropriations on February 25, 2019. It is currently in the House Rules Committee.

SB 5416 was passed out of the Senate Labor and Commerce Committee on February 12, 2019. It is currently in Senate Rules Committee.

Bills Supported by the Commission

2. HB 1064 and SB 5029, Concerning law enforcement

Representative Goodman's HB 1064 is an amendment to I-940. The bill was passed by the Legislature and signed by the Governor on February 4, 2019.

3. HB 1880 and SB 5818, Creating a joint legislative task force on problem gambling

Representative Kloba's HB 1880 and Senator Conway's SB 5818 establish a joint legislative task force on problem gambling. SHB 1880 was passed out of the House Commerce and Gaming Committee on February 19, 2019. It is currently in the House Rules Committee.

SB 5818 never received a hearing and it is dead for this session.

4. HB 1159, Changing the definition of theft

Representative Griffey's HB 1159 amends the definition of "theft" for purposes of theft-related offenses to include concealing the property of another intending to deprive the other person of its use or benefit.

The bill was passed out of the House Public Safety Committee on February 7, 2019 and it is currently in the House Rules Committee.

5. HB 1356, Concerning privileged communication with peer support group counselors

Representative Lovick's HB 1356 establishes a testimonial privilege for communications made by a first responder or local jail staff person to a designated peer support group counselor while receiving counseling based on an incident while acting in their official capacity.

SHB 1356 passed out of the House Civil Rights and Judiciary Committee on February 20, 2019 and it is currently in the House Rules Committee.

6. HB 1919, Preventing and responding to animal abuse & HB 1929, Restricting animal fighting paraphernalia

Representative Mosbrucker's HB 1919 amends the animal fighting criminal statute (RCW 16.52.117) to expand elements for violation of the statute relating to animal fighting, including adding animal fighting paraphernalia as something prohibited under the law.

SHB 1919 passed out of the House Public Safety Committee on February 21, 2019 and it is currently in the House Rules Committee. HB 1929 was not passed out of committee because its language is incorporated in SHB 1929.

Sports Gambling Bills

7. <u>HB 1975, Authorizing sports wagering subject to the terms of tribal-state gaming compacts.</u>

Representative Pettigrew's HB 1975 authorizes sports wagering only at Tribal facilities under the terms negotiated by the Gambling Commission in compacts.

The bill was heard in the House Commerce and Gaming Committee on February 14, 2019 and passed out of committee (8-3 vote) on February 21, 2019. It is currently in the House Appropriations Committee and is not expected to receive further consideration this session.

Sports Gambling Bills (cont.)

8. HB 1992, Concerning sports wagering

Representative Schmick's HB 1992 authorizes sports wagering on professional and collegiate sports under the Gambling Act (RCW 9.46) and the Horse Racing Act (RCW 67.16). The bill never received a hearing in the House Commerce and Gaming Committee and is dead for this session.

9. SB 5965, Relating to the sports wagering act

Senator Rivers' SB 5965 is a title-only bill that was referred to the Senate Ways and Means Committee. It is not expected to receive a hearing. My conversation with Senator Rivers is that she wanted a vehicle to allow sports gambling for commercial operators instead of HB 1975's Tribal-only authorization.

Bills with Direct Gambling Industry Impacts

10. HB 2041 and SB 5886, Relating to promoting the economic growth of the video game industry

Representative Hudgins's HB 2041 and Senator Mullet's SB 5886 are title-only bills that were filed to address the legal status of social online casinos. Neither bill received a hearing and both bills are dead for this session. There is a possible Senate Work Session on the topic that will occur later this session.

11. SB 5595, Exempting certain charitable or nonprofit organizations from obtaining a gambling license

Senator Mullet's SB 5595's amends the Gambling Act's statute regulating charitable and nonprofit unlicensed raffles, bingo, and/or amusement game activities. The bill did not receive a hearing in the Senate Labor and Commerce Committee and is dead for this session. We informed the sponsor that we will follow-up with his constituent believing the any issue can be worked out directly with the agency.

12. HB 1343 and SB 5129, Increasing revenues for the support of state government

These are OFM request bills that impose a capital gains tax and increase business and occupation (B&O) tax rate from 1.5 percent to 2.5 percent for games of chance.

The bill had a hearing in the Senate but no executive action scheduled at this time. There has been no hearing in the House at this time.

Law Enforcement Bills

13. HB 1269, Concerning seizure and forfeiture procedures and reporting

Representatives Shea and Goodman's HB 1269 addresses civil forfeiture standards and reporting.

SHB 1269 passed out of the House Civil Rights and Judiciary Committee on February 22, 2019 and is currently in the House Appropriations Committee. We still have concerns on the unfunded mandated reporting requirements in the bill, but no action is needed at this time.

Law Enforcement Bills (cont.)

14. HB 1253, Concerning the timeline for commencing basic law enforcement training

Representative Kloba's HB 1253 requires newly hired law enforcement personnel to commence Basic Law Enforcement Academy training within two months of employment, rather than within six months as currently required.

The bill was passed out of the House Public Safety Committee and is currently in the House Appropriations Committee.

15. SB 5121, Concerning embezzlement

Senator Honeyford's SB 5121 creates new criminal violations and penalties for embezzlement—financial fraud where money and property is stolen from a person or business.

The bill had a hearing in the Senate Law and Justice Committee on February 14, 2019. It did not pass out of Committee and is dead for this session.

Budget Bills

16. HB 1109 and SB 5153, operating appropriations

The House and Senate have filed their proposed 2019-21 operational budget bills. Neither bill currently impacts our gambling revolving account and funds the Problem Gambling Account at approximately \$1.4 million for the biennium. It is early in the budgeting process and I will inform you of any changes that will impact the agency or the gambling revolving account as amendments are made.

Public Records Act and State Government Bills

17. <u>HB 1537, HB 1538, SB 5246, Sunshine committee recommendations; and HB 1667, SB 5667, Concerning public records request administration</u>

These bills could have an impact on the agency's administration of its public disclosure program. These bills address different types of information collected and stored by the agency, including certain types of personal information and trade secrets, and potentially helpful changes to agency reporting requirements imposed by the legislature last year.

HB 1537, HB 1538, HB 1667 all passed out of the House State Government and Tribal Relations Committee. HB 1537 and HB 1538 are currently in the House Rules Committee and HB 1667 is in the House Appropriations Committee. We have concerns with HB 1538 but multiple state agencies have concerns and are working on amending the bill. I do not recommend taking any action on this bill at this time.

SB 5246 and SB 5667 did not make it out of Committee and are dead for this session.

Public Records Act and State Government Bills (cont.)

18. HB 1071 and SB 5064, Protecting personal information

HB 1840, Payment credentials and other sensitive data from state data networks;

HB 1844, Modular contracting for IT procurement by state agencies;

SB 5377, Data sales and governance; and

SB 5662, Cloud computing solutions;

These bills address the security and management of the agency's information technology infrastructure. Each bill could impact the agency and how it manages electronic information collected and used for its law enforcement and regulatory work.

19. HB 2093 and SB 5948, Creating a small business bill of rights

Representative Barkis' HB 2093 and Senator Palumbo's SB 5948 establish a list of rights for small businesses within the Administrative Procedures Act. HB 2093 has a hearing in the House State Government and Tribal Relations Committee on March 7th. SB 5948 passed out of the Senate Financial Institutions, Economic Development & Trade Committee and had a hearing in the Senate Ways and Means Committee on March 1, 2019.

We have concerns on the practical, legal, and fiscal implications of these bills. We will continue to monitor them and recommend no action at this time.

Commissioner Confirmations
