



There were 7 people in the audience and 24 people attended virtually.

Chair welcomed everyone to the Liquor and Cannabis Board and called the meeting to order at 9:32 AM. She announced that the meeting would be recorded and took the roll to ensure a quorum.

Tab 1-Consent Agenda and Executive Director's Report

Chair Levy asked the Commissioners if they had any changes to the consent agenda. They did not. She asked for public comment and there was none.

Commissioner Lawson moved to approve the consent agenda. Commissioner Ibsen seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously. 4:0

Director's Report

Tina Griffin, Executive Director (ED)

ED Griffin introduced and welcomed our new Human Resource Director Melanie Watness to the Gambling Commission. Melanie has over thirty years of HR experience including other limited jurisdiction law enforcement agencies. ED Griffin noted that the packet contains the latest information on the Disordered Gambling Advisory work group. She also pointed out that Washington State Attorney General (AG) Nick Brown joined the amicus

briefs with over thirty other states AG's and 60 tribes and tribal enterprises to reinstate the state's authority over Kalshi's sports-event contracts from the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit.

<u>Tab 2 Proposed Tribal Gaming Compact Amendment Hearing-Lummi Nation</u>

ED Griffin provided an overview of IGRA and the Tribal-State Compact process.

The Honorable Vice Chair Terrance Adams, Councilman Vendean Washington, and Sean Lawrence, Lummi Nation Chairman of the Lummi Gaming Commission, provided background of their tribal gaming in Washington, their regulatory approach, and an overview of the proposed Tribal-State Compact Amendment.

Jonnie Bray, Tribal Advisor, Provided an explanation over the proposed compact amendment changes in detail.

Chair Levy asked for public comments. There were no public comments and there were no written comments received.

Senator Conway made a motion to forward the proposed compact to the Governor. Commissioner Ibsen seconded the motion.
The motion passed unanimously. 6:0

<u>Tab 3 Commission Meeting Public Comment Guidelines</u>

ED Griffin presented the Commission Meeting Public Comment Guidelines for consideration to provide clear direction for those seeking to provide public comment on commission meeting agenda items.

Chair Levy asked for public comment. Carter Heald, a resident of Kent, talked about the proposed public guidelines and suggested an extension from the proposed two minutes to three minutes.

Natalie Keister, current resident of Auburn Washington, stated that today they are provided a two-minute timeline for public comment while the norm across the state is three-to-five-minute timeline and urged the commissioners to consider our request to extend the public comment time.

Commissioner Charles made a motion to adopt the amendment to update the public comment guidelines.

Commission Lawson seconded the motion.

The motion passed unanimously 4.0

Tab 4 Preparing for the 2026 Legislation Session

Tricia Gullion, Legislative and Rules Manager (LRM), revisited staff's proposed topics for agency request legislation in the 2026 session, which addressed animal fighting, addressing the criminal elements of theft from a vulnerable adult, and Commissioner Lawson's proposed changes to the state-wide self-exclusion program.

LRM Gullion recommended instead the agency focus on preventing future transfers from the gambling revolving fund

Discussion amongst the Commissioners and Ex-Officios centered on exploring the legislative changes regarding animal fighting.

<u>Tab 5 Rules Up for Discussion - Hearing Rules</u>

Adam Amorine, Legal Manager, presented staff's proposed changes to the hearing rules in WAC Chapter 230-17 as requested by the Commissioners in 2023. Staff will be meeting with tribal partners and stakeholders on these proposed rule changes in July.

Chair Levy asked for public comment, Senator Conway had comments on the penalties for animal cruelty and the expansion and costs associated.

<u>Tab 6 Rules Up for Discussion Rules to Implement Polaris</u>

Adam Amorine, Legal Manager, presented the staff's proposed rule changes necessary to implement Polaris, the new IT systems. Listening sessions for feedback on the proposed rules will be later this month, and staff will bring the feedback to the Commissioners next month.

<u>Tab 7 Presentation - State-Wide Self Exclusion Program</u>

Mark Collier, Special Agent with the Regulation and Enforcement Unit.

Mark provided a summary of the program that began in 2022 for participants to voluntarily ban themselves from gambling in HBCRs and tribal programs. As of this date, 1,279 participants have enrolled since 2022. One year, three-year, five- year and ten-year enrollment periods are offered for this program.

The chair asked for any questions or comments; there were no comments

Public Comment

Chair Levy asked for any final public comment from virtual attendees and those attending in person.

Carter Heald, resident of Kent, thanked the commission for talking about animal abuse issues. After talking with council members, he felt that HBCRs could help with that issue by allowing sports betting.

Natalie Keister, shared that they were there on behalf of the Washington State Cardroom Ambassadors and those that are struggling with addiction. Ms. Keister asked why a response has been received regarding their letter of June 18th. Chair Levy stated that she did not realize a response requested so Chair Levy will review the letter to see if one is warranted.

At 10:31 AM, Chair Levy adjourned the meeting.

IT Modernization Project

Since 2023, staff across the agency have devoted a great deal of time determining business requirements to replace our legacy licensing, case reporting, timekeeping, and billing systems. The My Account site used today will look much different when we replace our internal systems in January 2026.

For our partners and customers, this means more payment options, increased security, more efficient communication, and clarity with your submissions.

Benefits for applicants and licensees:

- **More online**: Moving nearly all applications and submissions online less paper errors or mail delays.
 - o Mail in payment will still be available.
- More payment options: People will be able to pay with debit, credit and bank transfers. In addition, anyone will be able to pay with a credit card instead of being limited to one user.
 - o **One payment for all licenses** instead of separate payments.
- **Expanded user access**: Organizations will be able to have multiple users in MyAccount, instead of just one user as it is now.
- Less emails: Secure document uploads and secure messaging through MyAccount will provide more efficiency in communications with Gambling Commission. In addition, licensees can initiate a message, instead of waiting for a secure message from the agency. Multiple document formats will be allowed for uploading.
- Expanded invoice visibility: More invoices and history will be available for review.
- **Know the status**: Applications and submissions will be tracked in real-time, so people know where things are at.
- Account switching: Users can easily switch between different businesses for work with Gambling Commission.

- Payment flexibility: Tribes will be able to submit applications and pay separately by mail or online. This is a big benefit and inability to do this has been a reason some tribes aren't yet online but now will be able to move online.
 - o In addition, anyone will be able to pay with a credit card.
- **Skip the mail**: Tribes will save time and money going online instead of spending money on postage and waiting for snail mail.
- **Expanded user access**: Organizations will be able to have multiple users in MyAccount, instead of just one user as it is now.
- Less emails: Secure document uploads and secure messaging through MyAccount will provide more efficiency in communications with Gambling Commission. In addition, tribes can initiate a message, instead of waiting for a secure message from the agency. Multiple document formats will be allowed for uploading.
- **Know the status**: Submissions will be tracked in real time, so everyone knows where things are at.

Replacing these systems is crucial for the agency to be able to sustain ongoing operations and provide efficient, effective licensing, regulatory, and enforcement services.

We are currently in the development and testing phase. We've already started requesting volunteer testers outside the agency to join us in testing in the late fall. We are also planning training for internal and external users on the use of MyAccount and the other new features available online to applicants, licensees, and tribal partners later this year.

<u>Illegal Offshore Gaming Operations</u>

On August 4, 2025, Attorney General Nick Brown, along with 49 other attorneys general, issued a letter to US Attorney General Pam Bondi requesting the US Department of Justice prioritize enforcement against the rampant spread of illegal offshore gaming operations.

The letter, which is attached, states these offshore entities routinely operate without proper licensure, offer-limited or non-existent consumer protections, and fail to verify user age, and ignore state boundaries.

The illegal gambling operations expose state residents, especially vulnerable adults and young people, to fraudulent schemes and addictive gambling activity without oversight, accountability, or protection. These entities operate outside of the state regulated markets and have been linked to illegal activity, such as money laundering and human trafficking.

Dear Attorney General Bondi:

We, the undersigned State Attorneys General, write to request assistance from the United States Department of Justice ("USDOJ") to address the rampant spread of illegal offshore gaming operations across the United States. Our States have heard reports concerning growth in the illicit offshore gambling markets that could be harming our citizens. While we as States do all we can to protect our citizens, such unlawful enterprises undermine the rule of law, threaten consumer protection, and deprive our States of significant tax revenues and economic benefits. We seek the USDOJ's cooperation in ensuring these companies are brought to justice to the fullest extent available under state and federal law, both criminal and civil, for any potential violations.

Background of Illegal Offshore Gaming

Illegal online sports betting and gaming operations—largely run by massive, foreign-based companies— reportedly pervade our jurisdictions. These offshore entities routinely operate without proper licensure, offer limited or non-existent consumer protections, fail to verify user age, ignore state boundaries, and evade taxation obligations potentially to both the Internal Revenue Service and our States.

These unlawful platforms expose residents—particularly young people and vulnerable adults—to fraudulent schemes and highly addictive gambling without any oversight or accountability. Moreover, these

operations undercut state-regulated markets and have been linked to money laundering, human trafficking, and other nefarious conduct.

Recent estimates show that the volume of illegal online gaming exceeds more than \$400 billion annually, leading to more than \$4 billion in lost tax revenue for state governments.¹ Despite these staggering figures, enforcement has been scarce, only emboldening these illegal operators.

A Path Forward: Joint USDOJ and AG Enforcement of Federal Law

Since 2013, USDOJ enforcement actions against illegal offshore gambling sites have been extremely limited. We seek USDOJ's cooperation and coordination to deploy robust legal tools to curb these unlawful enterprises. For instance, under the Unlawful Internet Gambling Enforcement Act, USDOJ can pursue injunctive relief to block access to illegal websites and payment processing mechanisms. See 31 U.S.C. § 5365(b). Additionally, under 18 U.S.C. § 1955(d), USDOJ has the authority to seize assets—including servers, domains, and proceeds—that illegal gambling operations use. Because the websites owned by unlawful offshore operations violate federal law, USDOJ can and should seize the websites and domain names of operators and retain any proceeds recovered as part of the seizure.

USDOJ has used its authority to seize online assets in analogous cases. On "Black Friday" in 2011, it seized websites, servers, and domain names of companies that sold counterfeit products.² In April 2024, the USDOJ successfully seized domains connected to a Russian cybercrime network engaged in large-scale identity theft and fraud.³ Those same mechanisms can and should be applied to illegal offshore gaming platforms.

Furthermore, the USDOJ and our offices should work in partnership with major payment processors to implement a national enforcement and compliance strategy to cut off access to the U.S. financial system. Both Visa and Mastercard have already signaled their willingness to investigate and address unlawful use of their networks for gambling transactions.⁴ We should capitalize on this willingness to shut down illegal offshore gaming operations.

Request for Cooperation

We strongly encourage USDOJ to prioritize enforcement against illegal offshore gaming operations. In its FY24 appropriations directive, Congress emphasized the importance of this issue.5 Under your leadership, we urge the USDOJ to coordinate with our offices to:

- Pursue injunctive relief and website seizures under federal law;
- · Seize assets and domain names of illegal offshore gaming operators; and
- Coordinate with financial institutions to block unlawful transactions and dismantle the financial infrastructure supporting these enterprises.

We stand ready to collaborate with the USDOJ to protect our residents and uphold the laws of our country and of our States.

Summary of Compact Changes (Consistent with other Compacts)

- Adds a framework for electronic table games at the Tribe's gaming facility.
- Authorizes extension of credit.
- Removes per facility limits on the number of tribal lottery system player terminals.
- Allows \$30 wagers on tribal lottery system player terminals.



Summary of Compact Changes

- Allows table game wager limits up to \$1,000 and a limited number of tables can offer wagers up to \$5,000 after customer screening.
- Provides an option for an additional 1,000 player terminals to be added to the Tribe's allocation and total operating ceiling, in a stepped approach.
- Creates a new appendix that includes all Tribal licensing and State background provisions and authorizes eligibility & registration.
- Creates a definition appendix that includes defined terms used in the Compact and Appendices.




Summary of Compact Changes (Contribution updates)

Contributions by the Tribe are replaced with:

- A non-smoking room requirement if smoking is allowed in the gaming facility.
- Enhanced responsible gaming provisions on training, self-exclusion, responsible gaming signage and posting, and self-imposed limits.
- The gaming facility is accessible to emergency services.
- The Tribe's commitment to the community through support to emergency service, government, and nonprofit/charitable organizations.

SUBJECT: Proposed 2026 Agency Request Legislation

As directed, staff is exploring agency request legislation to amend RCW 16.52.085, RCW 9.46.210 and RCW 16.52.011.

On July 23, we held feedback sessions with both tribal partners and the public. During these sessions, we received the following feedback:

Tribal Partners:

- Concerns regarding adding more to our plate and expanding our authority.
- Concerns using tribal funds to investigate these cases.
- Concerns as to why this is necessary as other agencies investigate these cases.

Public feedback:

- Some of the animal rights and animal control participants had concerns regarding:
 - The euthanasia of roosters, specifically altered roosters and ensuring individuals who rescue roosters previously involved in cockfighting don't fall under suspicion, potentially changing the language to clarify or add an exemption.
 - Authorizing agencies to euthanize roosters may lead to euthanasia for other reasons.
- Some of the prosecutors on the call had concerns regarding:
 - Unintended consequences euthanized before a vet examination and potential consequences for a later determination that roosters were not altered/mutilated or could have been rescued.
 - Euthanizing roosters could destroy potential evidence.
 - o Due process euthanizing roosters before that takes place.
- None of the participants had concerns with the Gambling Commission expanding authority to investigate animal fighting cases before a gambling nexus is established.

Great, thanks. Some of these questions came up during our feedback session. Our agents in the criminal enforcement division currently investigate animal fighting after a gambling nexus is established. The proposed language would authorize them to investigate animal fighting before the gambling nexus is established. We are currently working on what that fiscal impact would be. Yes, the funds would come from the fees paid by licensees.

We are not asking for more funds to do this work, we are looking into how many additional hours it would require of our agents and fiscal impacts before we proceed. We are also concerned that the legislature may come back and take additional funds from our account, just as they did in the 2025 legislative session.

This is still a draft, and the commissioners will make their final decision whether to move this forward or not at their commission meeting in August or September.

Subject: Comments on WA State Gambling Commission Potential Legislation for 2026

External Email

Dear Commissioners,

As the Executive Director of Joint Animal Services, President of the Washington Federation for Animal Care and Control Agencies, and a Board Member of the National Association of Animal Care and Control Agencies. I have over 21 years of expertise in this field. I appreciate the opportunity to comment on the proposed legislative changes regarding animal fighting investigations.

I support the proposal to grant the Washington State Gambling Commission the authority to investigate the use of animals in gambling-related fighting activities. Expanding investigative authority will help address these cases earlier, allowing law enforcement to intervene before a gambling nexus is fully established. This is a vital step in preventing prolonged animal suffering and dismantling organized animal fighting networks.

However, I oppose the proposed language that alters due process and undermines years of collaborative work dedicated to updating and strengthening Washington's animal cruelty laws. Due process protections ensure investigations and prosecutions are effective, defensible, and just. Any changes to existing statutes must be narrowly tailored to target the problem without weakening established legal safeguards or causing unintended consequences.

I agree that:

- Amending RCW 9.46.210 to authorize Gambling Commission investigations into animal fighting will address an important enforcement gap.
- Amending RCW 16.52.011 to include the Gambling Commission as a "law enforcement

agency" would enable earlier intervention in these cases.

Nevertheless, I strongly oppose authorizing the same-day, on-site euthanasia of roosters mutilated for fighting. Immediate euthanasia without proper veterinary evaluation and evidence collection could threaten both animal welfare and investigation integrity. Humane outcomes and due process require a licensed veterinarian to evaluate animals before euthanasia decisions are made.

I am also concerned about the proposed expansion of warrantless entry authority in RCW 16.52.085(1)(d). This change would permit law enforcement officers, animal control officers, and Gambling Commission investigators to enter private property without a warrant if they have probable cause to believe a rooster has been disfigured for fighting or training. There is no requirement that the animal needs immediate medical attention, nor is there an "emergency aid" purpose served by this change. Without a clear exigent circumstance, this provision risks constitutional challenges that could undermine investigations and prosecutions.

My concern is to ensure these amendments do not weaken the integrity of RCW 16.52, especially the balance between strong enforcement and fair legal process that stakeholders have worked hard to establish. I urge the Commission to carefully refine the language so the Gambling Commission's expanded role is clear, limited to its intended purpose, and consistent with established animal cruelty laws.

I am dedicated to working with lawmakers, the Gambling Commission, and other stakeholders to develop language that enables earlier enforcement, protects animals, and upholds due process. Together, we can strengthen Washington's ability to combat animal fighting without undoing the progress made in animal protection across the state.



Background

In recent Commission enforcement actions, motions, responses, and other legal documents have been filed for review associated with a particular petition for review or reconsideration days prior to the upcoming meeting. Some filings have been received less than 24 hours before the next Commission meeting, forcing a continuance.

The current rule framework does not directly address motions, responses, and similar pleadings with regard to timeliness. A rule change is necessary to implement a framework to address timeliness for filings before the Commission and reduce confusion and unnecessary continuances. Other parts of the rule chapter on Hearing Rules may also be amended to add clarity or ensure consistency.

At the July 2023 Commission meeting, Commissioners agreed to initiate rule making. The proposed changes to hearing rules (WAC 230-17) include:

- Procedures for the electronic submission of documents and notice for commission materials.
 The amendments update the rules to align with other similar state agencies and adopt the standards for electronic submission and notice as outlined in RCW.
- Limit the scope of interrogatories and requests for production from an unlimited number to 30, including all parts and subparts. This change will prevent abuse of the discovery process and limit the scope of proceedings to the issues at hand.
- Amending the submission process to clarify deadlines for documents to be considered before a commission meeting.

At the July commission meeting, Commissioners had an opportunity to discuss the proposed rule changes and allowed time for public comments. No comments were offered.

On July 23, 2025, staff held meetings with Tribal Partners and the public to hear general feedback regarding this rule change. No comments were offered at either meeting.

WAC 230-17-002 Administrative Rules In addition to these rules, for full adjudicative proceedings the commission adopts the model rules of procedure as set forth in WAC 10-08-035 through 10-08-230, as amended. If there is a conflict between the model rules and this chapter, the rules in this chapter shall govern.

- WAC 230-17-010 Requesting and scheduling a hearing. (1) Applicants, licensees, or permittees may request a hearing using the form we provide.
- (2) We must receive the request from the applicant, licensee, or permittee at our administrative office within twenty-three days after service of the notice.
- (a) Twenty-three days after we mail service by regular mail the notice of administrative charges; or
- (b) Twenty days after they receiveservice by certified mail the notice of administrative charges; or

Parties must serve copies of the petition to all other parties or their representatives at the time the petition for review is filed.
- (3) Petitions must specify the portions of the initial order the parties disagree with and refer to the evidence in the record on which they rely to support their petition.
- (4) Any party to an adjudicative proceeding may file a reply to a petition for review of an initial order. Parties must file the reply with us within thirty days of the date of service of the petition and must serve copies of the reply to all other parties or their representatives at the time the reply is filed.

The Commission will only consider a Petition and a reply to a petition; any other replies or responses will not be considered unless granted for good cause. If the reply falls within fifteen (15) days of the next regularly scheduled commission meeting, then the matter will be heard at the following regularly scheduled commission meeting unless otherwise scheduled.

- (5) Any party may file a cross appeal. Parties must file cross appeals with us within ten days of the date the petition for review was filed with us.
- (6) Copies of the petition or the cross appeal must be served on all other parties or their representatives at the time the petition or appeal is filed.
- (7) After we receive the petition or appeal, the commissioners review it at a regularly scheduled commission meeting within one hundred twenty days and make a final order.
- (8) The Commission or the Commission's designee shall have the authority, subject to the other provisions of these rules, to rule on all procedural matters.

- (4) Failure to pay required gambling taxes, where that is the only alleged violation in the administrative charges; and
- (5) Failure to pay a quarterly license fee or submit a quarterly license report or failure to pay a late fee assessed as a result of failure to pay a quarterly license fee or submit a quarterly license report or associated late fees; and
- (6) When the penalty we are requesting is a suspension of seven days or less; and
- (7) When the parties stipulate to using a brief adjudicative proceeding.

Background

The Washington State Gambling Commission has been working to replace the current legacy IT systems since March 2023 in an effort to modernize technology. As we approach implementation of the new IT systems, commission staff has identified several chapters of WAC Title 230 that will need to be updated. These rule changes will correspond to the new capabilities of the new IT system and allow for more efficient processes for staff, licensees, and applicants. For example, the new IT systems will allow for electronic submission of documents, electronic notification, and electronic service of documents.

These rule changes will likely affect several different WAC chapters, including but not limited to permitting and licensing rules (230-03), fees (230-05), rules for all licensees (230-06), fund-raising event rules (230-09), bingo rules (230-10), and hearing rules (230-17).

At the May 2024 Commission meeting, Commissioners approved initial rulemaking to address necessary changes associated with IT modernization. Since the May 2024 Commission meeting, staff have worked with contractors to develop new IT systems. As we near implementation of the new systems, staff have identified the following rules to be created or amended:

- WAC 230-03-018 One annual change of bingo premises allowed. This proposed rule change simplifies the application.
- WAC 230-03-028 (NEW RULE) Online application requirements. The goal is to have all applicants, licensees and permit holders to apply online. However, in the case of individuals who are unable to do so, this allows for a waiver for good cause. Good cause for preventing submissions online would apply to those who don't have access to the internet or another circumstance which would prevent an individual from submitting online.
- WAC 230-05-126 Online filing and payments required with waivers available upon request for good cause. Polaris will create a more efficient and streamlined process for filing reports and paying fees online for licensees. This rule changes clarifies who must file reports and pay fees online. This will allow for waivers if an individual is unable to do so online. Waivers will be granted for good cause such as if an individual does not have internet access.
- WAC 230-05-132 Late filing of quarterly license reports or late payments of quarterly license fees –
 Penalties. The proposed changes:
 - Clarify the due date of the quarterly license fee to be due at the end of the month following instead of 30 days.
 - Allow us to extend filing requirements for quarterly reports.
 - Allow licensees additional time or the ability to have fees waived for good cause.

- WAC 230-06-048 (NEW RULE) Gambling equipment inquiries. Inquiries for us to determine if equipment meets the definition of gambling equipment require an application and a deposit before we conduct the review. Inquiry submissions will be accepted online with a flat fee:
 - The proposed changes would require amendments to WAC 230-05-160 and WAC 230-05-170 as well to establish the associated fee.

At the July commission meeting, Commissioners had an opportunity to discuss the proposed rule changes and allowed time for public comments. No comments were offered.

On July 23, 2025, staff held meetings with Tribal Partners and the public to hear general feedback regarding this rule change. Commenters asked brief clarifying questions regarding the process and draft language but generally expressed support for the proposed changes.

After considering this feedback and upon further internal discussion, staff decided not to proceed with the new gambling equipment inquiry rule. Therefore, staff removed the proposed new rule, WAC 230-06-048, and the amendments to WAC 230-05-160 and WAC 230-05-170 from this rule package

Feedback

James Lambert provided public comment at the public feedback meeting held on July 24, 2025. Mr. Lambert expressed support for the rule changes, but suggested adding clarifying language to the proposed gambling equipment inquiry rule.

Staff Recommendation

Staff recommends filing the draft language for further discussion.

WAC 230-03-018 One annual change of bingo premises

- allowed. (1) Once each license year, a bingo licensee may apply to play bingo at a different location (special property bingo).
 - (2) The bingo activity is limited to:
 - (a) Three consecutive days; and
 - (b) Sixteen consecutive hours each day.

- (2) If you are unable to submit online, you must request a waiver in writing. Waivers will be granted if an individual or organization can show good cause. The reasons for good cause include:
- (a) You do not have access to the internet using your own computer or similar equipment; or
- (b) Some other circumstance or condition exists that, in our judgment, prevents you from submitting online.

WAC 230-05-126 Online Quarterly License Report filing and payments required with waivers available upon request for good cause. (1) All-licensees must submit Quarterly Licensing

Reports the following online, where applicable:

- (a) Renewal application and base license fees; and
- (b) Quarterly license fees; and
- (c) Quarterly license reports.
- (2) We may waive these this requirements if a licensed organization can show good cause. The reasons for good cause include:

WAC 230-05-132 Late filing of quarterly license reports or late payment of quarterly license fees—Penalties. (1) Licensees who do not file their quarterly license reports and/or pay quarterly license fees by the end of the month following within thirty days from the end of each quarter are in violation of this chapter.

- extend the time for making and filing any return, and may grant such reasonable additional time within which to make and file returns as it may deem proper.
- (3) Licensees will be afforded one thirty-day late filing and payment period after their quarterly license reports and quarterly license fees are due. However, a twenty-five dollar fee will be charged for each day a licensee fails to file a quarterly license report or pay quarterly license fees during the thirty-day late filing and payment period.
- (3) A licensee's failure to file quarterly license reports or pay quarterly license fees during the thirty-day late filing and payment period could result in administrative action against your their licenses.

- (4) The commission may, for good cause shown in writing, reduce or waive late filing fees as it may deem proper.
- (4)—(5) Licensees will be responsible for paying any outstanding license fees including, but not limited to, late fees and any additional costs associated with the collection of these fees before a license suspension is lifted or a new licensing application is approved.
